WHY STUDY THE BIBLE

First, it's an amazingly detailed and well-preserved picture of an ancient culture. The Bible can help us understand who we are based on the descriptions and stories of people who lived two to four millennia ago. It shows the development of Hebrew culture over a long period of time, helping us to understand how cultures rise and fall.

The Bible has also motivated scholars and archaeologists to search diligently for locations and people groups. It has provided a structure to fit seemingly random archaeological finds into a context.

One of the most important things about the Bible is that it tells the story of the Creator and his creation. It shares how humans are capable of great things, but also terrible things. It shows us how much the Creator cares for his wayward creation and what he has done to rescue it.

The Bible shares how Jesus, Israel's long-awaited King, was born humbly, how he loved and served the misfits and outcasts of the world. It tells us how he confronted the powerful and called *all* people to repent—to turn away from sin (our disobedience and our self-reliant attempts to control and manipulate in order to hang on to power).

The Bible tells the story of Jesus' life, death, resurrection, and ascension, and how he came to save mankind from an eternity apart from God. In the Bible, we learn that Jesus promised: all who turn from their evil and selfish ways and agree that he is Lord and Savior will have eternal life.



Called Church Conference to Consider an Amendment to the Church Constitution

The Church Constitution calls for the church to have 20 deacons who serve for four years. After a full four year term, a person is not eligible to be elected as an active deacon for two years. Through the years the possibility of making changes to the number and terms of deacons has been discussed. The deacons are proposing to the church that the term of deacon be reduced to 3 years with one year of not being eligible to be elected a deacon and lowering the number of deacons to 15. Following is what the Church Constitution says and what the new wording would be in the Church Constitution.

Currently in the Constitution (Article VI, Section 2, A):

Section 2 DEACONS

A. NUMBER AND TERM: The active Board of Deacons will be composed of twenty ordained deacons. When the resident membership exceeds 1000, two additional deacons will be added to the active Board for each additional one hundred resident members. The deacons will be elected for a term of four years with approximately twenty-five percent (25%) rotating off annually. An active deacon who has served a full, four-year term will be ineligible forre-election for two years.

The amendment would substitute the following for Article VI, Section 2, A.

A. NUMBER AND TERM: The active Board of Deacons will be composed of fifteen ordained deacons. When the resident membership exceeds 500, two additional deacons will added to the active Board for each additional one hundred resident members. The deacons will be elected for a term of three years with one-third of the deacons rotating off annually. An active deacon who has served a full, threeyear term will be ineligible to serve for one year.

If this amendment to the constitution is approved, in the year it is approved, there would be no election of deacons unless there were unexpired terms that needed to be filled. By not holding an election for one year it would reduce the number of deacons to 15.

For an amendment to be made, it must be presented to the deacons for their consideration and recommendation and then the proposed changes have to be presented to the Church at least thirty days prior to the time the vote is taken. Two-thirds of the members present at the called business conference of the church must approve the amendment.

There will be a Called Church Conference at the conclusion of the Worship Service on Sunday, October 18, 2020, for the purpose of considering the proposed amendment to the Church Constitution as outlined above.
